### **Health Tip** Mrs. Martia Metcalf



"If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land. Isaiah 1:19

Artificial dyes derived from petroleum are found in thousands of foods. In particular breakfast cereals, candy, snacks, beverages, vitamins, and other products aimed at children are colored with dyes. Even some fresh oranges are dipped in dye to brighten them and provide uniform color. In 2008 the Center for Science in the Public Interest (CSPI) in Washington, DC, petitioned the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to ban artificial food dyes because of their connection to behavioral problems in children. Two years later a new CSPI report, Food Dyes: A Rainbow of *Risks*, further concludes that the nine artificial dyes approved in the United States likely are carcinogenic, cause hypersensitivity reactions and behavioral problems, or are inadequately tested. This includes the Red 40, Yellow 5, and Yellow 6, which accounts for 90% of the dyes used in foods. Artificial dyes are not the only way to create brightly colored foods; many countries use vegetablebased dyes such as carrot and pumpkin extracts for orange, strawberries and strawberry extract for pinks and reds. These are wonderful alternatives that won't negatively affect our children's health.

Next time you are making colored frosting, try these natural alternatives instead: Blue = Blue spirulina powder Green = Culinary grade matcha powder Pink = Beets Purple = Blackberries

Most of us have got our counting by 10's down. So this week we have started learning to count by 5's.


This week our letter was Y and our number was 16.
